Clean Virginia seeks an **Energy Policy Fellow** to support our team with research and analysis surrounding the 2025 General Assembly legislative session. Clean Virginia works to end monopoly utility corruption and advance clean energy and regulatory policy that alleviates the energy burden of Virginia families. The Energy Policy Fellow will conduct detailed research on a variety of Virginia energy topics, including energy demand and cost allocation, energy efficiency, performance-based regulation, utility rate design, and state energy planning. The position will focus primarily on policy topics that develop throughout the 2025 Virginia General Assembly session.

This position reports directly to Clean Virginia's Energy and Regulatory Policy Director and will work closely with Clean Virginia's legislative team and Energy Policy Analyst. The ideal Energy Policy Fellow will work full-time for at least 10 weeks starting in December 2024 through mid-March 2025. Part-time applicants will be considered and the position could continue through April.

This position may work remotely, with a preference for availability for in-person meetings in Richmond, Virginia. Compensation is \$25 an hour with 90% of monthly health insurance coverage (only available for full-time), \$75 monthly personal device reimbursement, and workers' compensation.

Clean Virginia is an independent and bipartisan advocacy organization with an associated Political Action Committee. We are working toward a Virginia where clean, affordable and reliable energy is accessible to all, and where elected officials are accountable to the communities they serve. - Write memos, issue briefs, and short reports for multiple audiences, including legislators and partner organizations.
- Ensure Clean Virginia's values of equity, diversity, and inclusion are centered in our research, policy proposals, and related content.
- Other duties as assigned by the Energy and Regulatory Policy Director.

Preferred Qualifications

- Undergraduate or graduate degree of a relevant discipline, or current enrollment in the last year of an undergraduate program or current enrollment in a master's degree program of a relevant discipline (e.g., environmental science, political science, public policy, economics, etc.).
- Strong quantitative skills and sufficiency with Excel or similar spreadsheet software.
- Strong research, writing, and editing skills.
- Ability to work independently and take ownership of projects and assignments.
- Strong interpersonal skills and attention to detail.
- Demonstrated interest in energy policy or regulation of utility monopolies.
